### Let's Learn about Spiders!

There are 2 different types of insects. There are those that are **beneficial** and help us. Then there are those that are **pests** and cause damage. Spiders are also helpful but they are not insects, instead we call spiders arachnids!

They catch and eat many of the insects we consider pests, like flies and beetles.



Many spiders will spin a web made from silk which is how they catch their dinner.



Their bodies are covered with little hairs. These little hairs are very sensitive and help the spider know what is going on around them.

Most spiders are harmless, but some are very dangerous, so it's best to leave them alone!

**Spiders do not have all of the parts that you learned an insect must have.**

Antennae	2	0
Mouth	4 different types	Jaws with fangs
Eyes	2 compound eyes 3 simple eyes	Most have 8
Wings	0, 2, or 4	0

# Career Corner



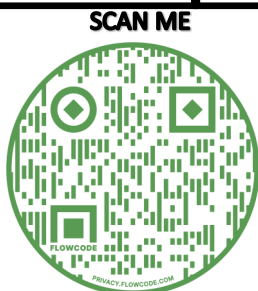
